Quarter & Cadzow Community Council

The Community Council over this past year has been pursuing the Council on the condition of the roads, for the safety of the school children and for the general wellbeing of the village. The roads have improved slightly, with repairs having been carried out and posts having been erected for what are assumed is to be speed signs i.e. telling you what speed you are travelling at and encouraging you to slow down if necessary. The village school has been examined and it would appear that a new school would be a better option than upgrading the old building. What will happen to the old building is not yet clear but it is hoped that the Community Council will be consulted on the issue. The Council's Path Project is still ongoing and any information regarding walks in and around the village is still welcome.

Quarter Community Association

The Association in conjunction with the Community Council and Quarter in Bloom has embarked on an ambitious project to redevelop the vacant plot at Cadzow Road into a restful park area with a monument. Planning permission is being sought but having talked to the housing and roads department who have no objections, it should be a matter of course before the Council receives



permission. It is now up to the Association to discuss with the residents the proposed options and this will be taking place some time in the near future. Two Coal Hutches from the Mining Museum at Newtongrange, have already been obtained. Incidentally this is a very good museum to visit, with trips down a coal mine, a museum and a

cafe. The picture shows the state of disrepair of the hutches, but they will be cleaned up and painted before going on display.

Preparing a Hanging Basket

A well planned hanging basket can not only create a focal point in the garden but can also compliment other tubs and containers as part of a summer floral display.

Initially you will require to select the size of basket you want to use. The larger the basket the more plants will be able to be utilised and more colourful it will be. There are a number of designs of baskets and liners available and hence it is important to review the various designs in relation to your particular requirements. One of the most popular designs available today is a plastic moulded unit which has 12 insert panels around the body of the basket which eliminates the need for a liner and also ensures a uniform distribution of plants. Many gardeners and garden centres however prefer to use the traditional wire basket lined with moss, polythene, coir fibre or compressed paper pulp. Ideally the liner should protrude marginally from the top of the basket to allow for shrinkage during filling and also to ensure ease of watering. Prior to starting to fill the basket, a saucer or piece of polythene should be placed in the bottom of the basket to assist in retaining moisture. Another solution to making the watering process easier is to insert a small flower pot in the middle of the completed basket, sunk up to the rim. This improves the watering process but unfortunately prevents you from having a larger plant in the centre of the basket. The following steps are adopted in filling a hanging basket:

- 1. Remove the chain from the basket and place basket on a bucket or large plant pot to stop it from falling over.
- 2. Fill the basket to about halfway with a good quality compost and add some water retaining crystals and slow release fertiliser. Mix both well into the compost and add a little water.
- 3. The side plants such as hanging lobelia, impatiens, nepeta, sutera cabana etc. can now be added through the small holes/slots in the basket liner. Insert the plant root first through the hole in the liner making sure that the roots are well contained in the compost.
- 4. Add more compost to about 1 inch from the top and then begin to add the main plants beginning at the centre and working outwards towards the rim. It is important that the top surface of the soil slopes into the centre of the basket. This will help to retain the added water. If the basket is overfilled with compost it will be extremely difficult to water the basket, particularly if it has dried out.
- 5. Once you have completed the planting put the chain back on and hang the basket in a position where you can step back and look at the basket in relation to balance and plant configuration.
- 6. Any spaces identified can be filled with chosen plants.
- 7. The excess lining material protruding from the basket can now be trimmed ensuring that the compost is well contained and will not come out during watering.
- 8. If possible, after watering, the basket should be hung in a greenhouse for several weeks to grow on and fill out prior to being placed in your chosen site after the risk of frost has past.

Every year, many baskets are spoiled due to the support bracket arm being too short for the basket or the bracket not being held securely to the wall or post. As the basket will require to be watered and the dead heads removed at regular intervals, it must be easily accessible. Rather than using step ladders you can purchase a Hi-Lo system which enables the basket to be lowered to a chosen height making these tasks more simple to do. On completion, the basket can then be raised into its formal position. To ensure that the plant growth is uniform throughout the growing season some gardeners fit a hanging basket swivel hook which permits the basket to be manually rotated without twisting the support chains. There is a solar powered basket turner on the market this year which rotates the basket automatically thus ensuring uniform growth.

As a general guide the plant requirements for a 14 inch hanging basket could be as follows:

1 zonal geranium 2 trailing fuchsias' 2 trailing geraniums4 trailing plants (lobelia, ivy, nepeta, lysimachia goldii etc)

2 miniature petunias 3 filler plants such as verbena, diascia, lamium etc

As there is a wide variety of plants available on the market suitable for hanging baskets you can get ideas from visiting the garden centres that not only sell plants but also supply filled hanging baskets. This will help you to decide on which combination of plants you require to have the biggest impact. Indeed you may just decide to buy one rather than undertake the filling yourself! However, whether to make your own hanging basket or purchase one complete, a well prepared and cared for basket can be an attractive feature in the garden over the summer months.


