The major project this year has been the Church front garden. Quarter in Bloom had been asked by the Church Board to come up with a plan to freshen up the front garden. After drawing up plans which were approved, we then embarked on acquiring the finance which was provided by Viridor Waste Management via Forward Scotland, South Lanarkshire Rural Partnership, Awards for All, Mr. Gillooly of Inland Engineering, Weir Power & Industrial Division, and all local businesses, thank you very much indeed. Our local builder, David Peffers, began work on June 29th by removing all the old slabs, turf and various bushes. Over the next four weeks he and his assistant did an excellent job of rebuilding the front garden. Once the raised beds and Coal Hutches were in place the Quarter in Bloom team got to work planting them up, and an excellent job they With the two front benches, donated by Mr & Mrs R. Anderson, in place, the garden was all set for viewing and taking a restful minute of relaxation. The railings were painted by Mr. R. Wardlaw in black and gold, adding a touch of class.

Once the project was started we kept adding to the work, when we



saw where we could make improvements, i.e. the addition of the four steel planters in the top corner, positioned to give a spiralling down effect. Extra planters were used to give the finishing touches. We would like to thank Newtongrange Mining Museum for the coal hutches, Summerlee Museum for the rails, Jim Baird for the red chips and Matthew Baird for the genuine miners picks.

I think you will agree the Quarter in Bloom Committee did an excellent job of designing, planning and executing the construction of the garden and Miners Monument.
