South Lanarkshire Community Paths Project

'Tell us where to go......'

South Lanarkshire Council, with the help of South Lanarkshire Access Forum, is currently running a consultation exercise across the authority relating to outdoor access in order to fulfil the obligation to produce a core path plan by 2008. The core path plan will consist of routes, both on land and water, which are deemed to provide reasonable outdoor access for the people of South Lanarkshire and its visitors.

Our aim is to improve access opportunities for everybody regardless of age, ability or interest in the outdoors. Through a series of community consultation events, a network of routes will be identified around settlements in the area that enables residents to leave their front door and access their local green space or the wider countryside.

What we are looking for is information on where people currently walk, cycle, horse ride, paddle canoes, any issues with these routes, information on routes that people would like to use, and any general issues with access e.g. for people with disabilities. This information is gathered by asking people to draw lines on maps and to fill in questionnaires. Both path users and landowners are invited to put their views.

"From the Editor: As a disabled person myself I would be very pleased if all you keen walkers would like to describe the terrain of the walk. Are there stiles to climb over and in general is the path suitable for wheelchair, crutches or a walking stick users? A rough distance of the walk and what we can expect to see along the way would also help. If you would like to take a camera and give a detailed study of the area so much the better. This would be a great boost to the tourist trade and combined with the Quarter Community Association's project of detailing the history of Quarter, would add up to giving a fuller picture of Quarter and surrounding area." Please pass on your information to Carol Cain or the Editor Alan Johnstone, at 17 Darngaber Gardens, Quarter and I will relay this information to Alan Bannister the Access Development Officer of South Lanarkshire Council.

My name is Bill Cleland living in Albuquerque, NM USA. I was referred to your site by Jim Monie of Stonehouse, when I asked him about the Village of Plotcock. You have put a great site on line.

In the 1861 Census, James Cleland (my great great grandfather and his family were listed in the Village of Plotcock; Jame's father Thomas died in 1858 in Plotcock and is buried in Stonehouse Parish. I have never been able to find anything about Plotcock prior to my correspondence with Mr. Monie. I still have questions about Plotcock; Perhaps you can help or direct me to someone? Was Plotcock an Ironstone Mining Community? A Company owned town? What company? What were the names of the pits or mines being worked in Plotcock in the mid 1800's? Is Plotcock part of Quarter? Any information that you have on Plotcock will be greatly appreciated.

I have been doing some research into my family history (all were miners) and have discovered in the 1891 census they lived in Allanton Row & in 1901 in Furnace Row. Later in 1924 when my great grandfather died his address was Eddlewood House. I am looking for any information on Eddlewood House. His name was Francis McGlynn. I would love to know if anyone has any information they could pass on to me.

Hello Alan.

I was in touch with you a couple years ago regarding the Flemings of Quarter in the 1800's. Though I wasn't sure at the time, I had a strong feeling that they were my ancestors. After lots of research and a little help along the way, I now know that most, if not all, the Flemings on the 1851 Quarter census were my Flemings.

I'm wondering if you know of any Fleming descendants still residing in Quarter, and if so I would be thrilled to make contact with them.

I will forward my family history and a letter written by John Fleming, son of my great great grandfather William. John was a master mariner and made several voyages to the UK in the late 1800's. The visit he tells about in this letter was around 1874, and the aunts he speaks of visiting were Christy and Sarah Gilmour.

I'm trying to search for my grandfather who according to my mother's birth certificate was a gamekeeper at Quarter residing at Lady Mary Lodge. My grandmother was Betsy Robertson Kidd and although I traced her from Quarter to were she died in Hamilton I cannot get anything on my grandfather whose name was Alexander Paterson. My mother was illegitimate, which was a disgrace as you know in those days. Although they were both present when they registered her birth, as both their names are on the birth certificate. My mother's name was Elizabeth Scott Robertson Paterson born 16th February 1910 at Hillside, Bothwell. Her birth was registered at Uddingston on the 3rd March 1910. Can you give me any information on how I can get further information. I would be entirely grateful for any help or advice you can give me. With Kind Regards Christine Torrie

Just a note to say thank you for your site. I have found it very interesting reading. My relatives, MOFFAT, RODGER and NEILSON all spent time in this area. In fact John RODGER and his wife Margaret (Peggie) nee NEILSON both died at 1 Furnace Row in 1921 and 1915 respectively.

At the time of the 1901 census they were living at 23 Furnace Row and prior to that at Limekilnburn. My great uncle Samuel MOFFAT was born at

21 Carscallan Row Quarter in 1905.

I was interested to see the photograph of houses at Quarter and wondered if you had others that were not published on your site. I would be interested in any other information you have about Quarter or any of my family in particular Thank you for your time. Regards Joan Mohr, Australia
