The Return of Quarter Gala Day, 1986

Quarter Parish Church was badly damaged by fire in 1982 and after a long rebuilding programme it was reopened for public worship in 1984. To celebrate the reopening it was decided to hold a fun day within the Church grounds. This was organized by Harry Harris and a committee of church members. All the children, some in fancy dress, assembled in the car park at the pub and proceeded to march from the pub along the pavement on Limekilnburn Road up to the church lawn where games and races took place. It was a lovely sunny day and a lot of local people turned up to what was a very successful and happy day and great fun for the children. Many of the older local people said they could remember 1936 when Quarter last held a village Gala Day and after seeing this very small attempt at bringing the children and the village together in a fun day, a few of the villagers decided that if we could form a committee it would be possible to reintroduce the Gala Day in Quarter. A statement in the local newspaper by Mr. McLennan, Head Master, read, "It is a tradition that went back a long time. After all, Quarter was one of the oldest mining villages in Britain".

After a few meetings in the pub a committee was duly formed and Harry Harris was elected Chairman and the first Quarter Gala Day in present times was under way. It was agreed that Gala Day would be the first Saturday in June. In those days everything had to be organized and paid for by the Committee, so to raise funds we had to organize various activities to raise enough money to pay for a band to lead the parade and prizes for the competition winners. During the year various nights were organized such as Whist drive, Race night, Quiz night and Christmas dance. The Christmas dance was held in the Boolin Club and Jimmy Paterson supplied the band. Pies and peas were supplied at a cost of 50p.each. The raffle prizes were a ½ bag of potatoes, 2½ bottles of whisky and a bottle of Martini.

All the stalls for Gala Day were made in timber and covered in polythene and games were also made. The coconut stands were made by the local blacksmith, the roll a penny table was also home made, the crown for the gala Queen was

borrowed, the dress for the Queen was an old bridesmaid's dress, the floats were supplied by the local farmers, the grass in the park was cut using Harry's petrol lawnmower, the bunting to decorate the streets was bought from Carstairs Mental Home and erected to the lamp posts using a ladder and tied with string, ice cream was bought from Equi's in a sealed container and the Bar-b-Q was an old oil drum filled with the charcoal. During week

nights prior to Gala Day various events took place, like 5-a-side football preliminary rounds, a pet show, Bonny Baby competition, Cycling skills, Bowling competition etc. The night before Gala Day a lot of the men assembled in the park to erect the stalls etc. and after a hard night's work a crate of beer was supplied and enjoyed by all present. Everyone then adjourned to the pub to start the Gala celebrations.

On Gala Day all the men were at the park again at 8.00am to make sure everything was ready. Home made stakes were hammered into the ground and tape, usually acquired from some building site, was erected to form areas for children's races and football. At about 10.30am the women would appear with rolls in sausage and bacon and any beer from the night before was duly finished off. The main parade started at the top of the village in Darngaber Gardens and proceeded

through the village led by The Boy's Brigade Pipe Band to the park where all was ready for the big day.

In the park there were stalls manned by the committee, a tea tent and, most importantly, a beer tent (this was supplied by the pub). There were games like bat the rat, beat the goalie, slippery pole, roll a penny, coconut shy etc.



After the official opening of Quarter Gala, by Mrs. McDowall, the Gala Queen, Audrey Todd, was crowned. The children's races were held and when all the prizes of sweets were handed out, the local boys, who had formed their own teams, took to the field to compete in the five-a-side tournament final. This was a very competitive game as every boy in the village



was desperate to win to prove that they were the best. After all the fun was about to end a tug-o-war rope would appear in the middle of the field and a team from the pub would challenge all comers to a Pull and then with all the kids on one end and all the parents on the other they would pull to see who was the best. This usually ended up with

everybody falling about laughing. After everybody had left the field the next job was to clear away all the stalls, etc and the entire field was cleared of all rubbish and left as if nothing had taken place. The rest of Saturday night was spent at a party in the pub. On the Sunday it was back up the ladders to take down all the bunting and return Quarter back to the lovely quiet village that we love. For 20 years a Gala Day had been held in Quarter and each year it grew to such an extent that it was renowned throughout Lanarkshire. It was a highlight in the Village calendar. The last Gala was held in 2006. Unfortunately a committee could not be formed to organize the 2007 Gala due to lack of interest by villagers.

Each church could purchase a small tent and use it as a "story-telling" venue. The tents were part of a tent village with more than two hundred churches participating.

The weekend was blessed with glorious weather and people came in their droves to attend the massive opening worship and all the other activities for children, young people and different interest groups.

The Quarter Parish Church had a tent and exhibition showing its involvement and witness over the years in the village of Quarter. The great support given to the Malawi Project over many years was the mission focus, and the Annual Charity Fundraiser for the Children's Aids Ministry in Africa also attracted some attention.

There were exhibits showing the work of the Guild, the Sunday School, the Friday Lunch Club and the Gardening Club who regularly support fundraising in the church. Those who attended the National Gathering were pleased to meet churches from as far a field as the Shetlands and Dumfries. There were many young families who were clearly dedicated to the life of the church, and this was very encouraging. Among the two hundred exhibition tents there developed a sense of camaraderie.
