# **Quarter in Bloom**

March has arrived. The weather varies more in March than in any other month and can delay sowing due to colder temperatures. In areas where it can fall below 6c, plants and even grass will wait until April before beginning to grow. Dry and windy weather provides ideal conditions to begin tidying up. Borders can be cleaned out and stems cut down. Think about applying a dressing to the soil. When spring-cleaning the herbaceous border remember the peonies should be left strictly alone. They resent disturbance and demonstrate their feelings by sulking.

Much time will be spent this month in seed sowing and hardening off seedlings. Always be aware of the importance of fine tilth for successful sowing. The seed that lands on a clod has an underprivileged youth. Seedlings must be pricked out before they jostle each other otherwise they will grow tall and spindly. Don't begin to harden them off too early. Allow them to acclimatise to the cold slowly. Cold frames can be opened, but do not rush it. Just open them a little bit daily until they can be fully opened. If seedlings turn colour or stop growing then beware.

When should roses be pruned? This is the most controversial subject among the rose experts, but the majority agree that mid-February in the south to mid-April in the north is the best time, just when the sap begins to rise. There are many who prune in December or January and are confident this leads to earlier and larger blooms. Much will depend on the climate and weather. The aim of the operation should be to keep the bush open to light and air, removing dead or crossing branches and weak wood. Moderate pruning is advised, tackling the strongest varieties first. The

floribunda is probably the most difficult bush to prune. Light pruning of young wood and moderate pruning of older wood should result in the bush flowering continuously throughout the summer. Many shrubs can be pruned now to within 1-2 inches of last years growth. The resulting growth will bear next year's flowers. Buddleia should be cut back hard to within a few inches of the ground or, in the case of old plants, to the previous season's wood and with hydrangeas remove flower heads only.

The greenhouse should have been thoroughly cleaned and ready for use. Half-hardies like asters, french marigolds, stocks, petunias and others should be sown in a warm greenhouse or kitchen. They should be pricked out when the first true leaves open. (continued on back)



Geraniums should be re-potted, or potted on, using a fibrous loam. The plants should be watered moderately for the first ten days after re-potting and a watch kept for white fly on the leaves.

Lawn care can begin in earnest this month. machines and other tools should have been overhauled and placed on 'stand by'. Start brushing, raking and piercing the turf with a fork when weather permits. A roller should be seldom used and only when the lawn is wet. If a roller is too heavy it could compact the soil and turf. Start mowing with blades set high and rake grass between mowing. causes the grass to stand up to meet the blades and is only topped. A new lawn should not be cut until 3 inches high. April will be here before you realise it and is the month of

hope and anticipation. Enjoy your gardening J.M.

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
